

Doppler effect is defined as the apparent change in the frequency caused by the relative motion between the source of the wave and the observer. A common example is that of an ambulance with its siren blasting. You may recall that as the ambulance travels towards you, the pitch of the siren ( or the frequency) of the siren appears to be high and then after the ambulance passes by and moves away from observer the pitch/frequency of the siren appears to bellow. This shift in the apparent frequency for a wave produced by a moving source is the doppler effect. Another common experience is the shift in the apparent frequency of the sound of a train horn. As the train approaches, the sound of its horns is heard at a high pitch and as the train moves away,





In diagram 1, the wave producing source is stationary. In this case, the observed frequency is equal to the actual frequency.




